


Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Every so often, I run across an article or blog which expresses my own feelings and thoughts better than I could. I received an email “blog” from Nicole Padley called “Behold.” She is a Catholic mother who writes about her attendance at Mass with her family during this strange COVID time. I thought you might be interested in her reflections:

“As (my family rushes) into the sanctuary a flood of emotions runs through me. I’ve been anxiously anticipating a return to Mass for weeks now. Quickly we are ushered into the pew moments before Mass begins, and then the wiggles, the giggles, the shushing, and redirecting starts. By the end of Mass, I am exhausted. “Is that it?” I think to myself feeling utterly underwhelmed by it all. What about the singing? What about the good-natured sign of peace? And the donuts? How am I supposed to tell my four kids that there won’t be donuts anymore?

Does this sound familiar to anyone?

“So why even bother?

“Why spend Sunday after Sunday frantically rushing around the house repeating this chaos? I mean the dispensation for attendance is still in effect. Plus, I can always catch the live stream at some point during the day.

“While participating in Mass from home can certainly be fruitful for growth in our relationship with the One Who is Love, our lack of receiving Him fully and alive in the Eucharist doesn’t hurt God; it hurts us. (emphasis mine).

“Humans are complex and nuanced. We require little to survive but so much more to thrive, and the same is true of our spiritual lives. He has created us for more. Jesus, told us so.

“I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly.” John 10:10

Mass isn’t for God, it’s for us.

“While my humble presence at Mass can neither add nor take away anything from His glory, it does directly impact my own road to salvation, my own growth in the spiritual life. It is precisely through the Mass, and particularly through the reception of Eucharist that God in His infinite love and goodness is leading me into His glory. He is revealing Himself to me—transforming me to become more like Him. So no, attending and participating in the Mass isn’t for Him, it’s for me.

He longs to pour out His blessings on us.

“Our God is a God of extravagance and generosity. One who will not be satisfied with giving us just enough grace to get by. Rather, He desires so deeply to give us all of Himself, not just once but over and over again at every single Mass. ...

“It’s nothing short of miraculous really. At each and every Mass He gives us the balm to soothe our weary souls, and the strength we need to carry us through another week. He graces us and blesses us with the gift of Himself in the Eucharist.

“He shows up every single time. It doesn’t matter if we are cranky, or brimming with joy, running later than we hoped, or settling in early enough to offer a few prayers before Mass begins. He is there, and not only that but He simply delights in our presence there with Him.

“While there will still be weeks when my little family rushes into Mass struggling to make it just in the nick of time, I will continue to push against the resistance for I know my Lord waits for me there.”

I am happy to let you know that we will be able to meet in person again on **Saturday, August 1st** at 7:00 A.M. to pray the Precious Life Rosary and Divine Mercy Chaplet together! We are required to maintain certain restrictions, but we can meet together nonetheless. We will meet in the main church to pray together. The restrictions are as follows:

- Sanitize your hands when you enter the church
- Each person will need to sit in a separate pew (unless of course you came together)
- Each person must wear a mask
- There is to be no singing
- After we are done praying, we must leave the church building (there is to be no congregating inside to talk/visit with one another)
- Sanitize the area where you sat before leaving the church

Step-Two in the Opening of the Church

Bishop Zinkula has announced that we may proceed to step-two in the diocesan protocol for the re-opening of churches. Effective Monday, June 22, daily Mass will be scheduled at the customary times. Mass will be celebrated in the church in order to ease the social distancing requirement of six feet between family groups. Those who attend Mass should sanitize their hands in the gathering space, and again before and after Communion, using a personal sanitizer which is to be brought with you from your home when you come to Mass. On Tuesday there will be Mass only; no exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. We are encouraged to limit the amount of time people are gathered in the church. The celebration of Mass will be brief. For daily Mass please occupy the seats off of the center aisle, leaving the far sections of pews to the east and west empty. This will aid in sanitation. Instructions for the reception of Holy Communion will be given at the Mass.

Weekend Masses have resumed at the customary times.

There are new protocols for the weekend Masses. These are put in place for your health and for the health and well-being of others in the church. Your patience and cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

- ◆ At this time, you will not need to register for Mass. Numbers attending is still low enough. If it would increase, then the policy may be changed.
- ◆ Until such time that a pattern is established regarding how many people wish to attend Mass each weekend, please do not register to attend Mass more than twice a month.
- ◆ When you arrive at church, you will be asked to provide your name for the hospitality minister to record. We need to keep track of who attends each Mass, in case someone at Mass later is diagnosed with COVID-19, thus we would know who might have been near that person at a previous Mass.
- ◆ A face mask or shield must be worn by those over two years of age.
- ◆ There will be no bulletins or missalettes.
- ◆ You will be seated by a hospitality minister, filling one section of the church before occupying another area. This will be from the front of the church to the back. Please cooperate and take the seat to which you are directed by the hospitality minister.
- ◆ Only every third pew will be used.
- ◆ Social distancing between family groups in the pews will be observed.
- ◆ There will be no entrance procession of the priest.
- ◆ There will be no altar servers.
- ◆ One lector will do both readings.
- ◆ There will be no singing; only instrumental music is allowed.
- ◆ No collection basket will be passed. Receptacles in which you may drop your collection envelope or cash will be placed on a table just inside the carpeted area north of the gathering space.
- ◆ There will be no procession of the gifts. The bread and wine for the Eucharist will be in the sanctuary prior to the start of Mass.
- ◆ Only the clergy will receive the Precious Blood of the Lord.
- ◆ Holy Communion will be distributed to the faithful only under the species of the Sacred Body, and only in the hand. You should bring your own small bottle of sanitizer and sanitize your hands before and after receiving Holy Communion. Additional instructions for the reception of Holy Communion will be given just before Communion is distributed.

- ◆ The clergy or Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will come to you, in the empty row ahead of you, to distribute Holy Communion in your hand.
- ◆ For exiting the church the faithful will be dismissed by a hospitality minister.
- ◆ The Mass is to take no more than 30 minutes. The homily must be brief.
- ◆ A thorough sanitization of the church follows each Mass, but may begin one hour after the end of the previous Mass.
- ◆ The faithful continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass each holyday and Sunday.
- ◆ First Communion and Confirmation may be celebrated at the weekend Masses, but only for 2-3 families at a Mass.

Be aware that these policies and practices are very fluid, depending on changes from the Diocese of Davenport.

Wising Up

There are various kinds of wisdom: the kind you get by watching carefully to discover how something works, or by learning from a mistake; the wisdom in taking advice from someone and not making the mistake he made; the political, social, or religious wisdom learned by those who work in these vocations. There is also wisdom that is just beyond our reach, the kind that is found only in God.

This Sunday's readings discuss various kinds of wisdom. King Solomon asks for "a listening heart" (1 Kings 3:9), the knowledge needed to rule his people wisely. He is told he can ask for anything: long life, riches, security from his enemies, all blessings that would certainly benefit him. Instead he asks for something to benefit his people. It seems he is wise enough to know he needs such wisdom. The psalm response praises the law, the religious tradition that provides instruction for living a life of holiness and thus reaping the rewards of such a life.

The parable in the Gospel describes various life situations in which decisions have to be made. In the first two instances, a question is posed: What is the kingdom of heaven worth to you? What are you willing to give up in order to attain it? The third depicts fishing with a net, a very strenuous task. A question here might be: Are you willing to work hard at this? Are you discerning in separating good actions from bad? It takes real wisdom to answer such questions.

Should we send our child to a Catholic school? Luckily, we can afford it. But what are the advantages?

A 2019 study by the National Center for Education Statistics shows that the all-important math and reading assessments for Catholic school fourth- and eighth-graders surpassed those of their public school cohorts.



A well-run Catholic school can offer your child an educational experience and life formation based on the message, values, and principles of Jesus Christ. These are the pre-eminent reasons to choose a Catholic school. You want your child to hear the story of Jesus, to know and admire him, to grow up as one of his devoted friends and disciples. Children need to see the message of Jesus lived out enthusiastically by their parents, teachers, and the adult faith community, of which the school is a part. Catholic schools will teach a value system clearly rooted in Jesus' gospel message. The children will discover that God's creation is good, to be respected and cared for. The children will sense and appreciate their own intrinsic worth as human beings and the dignity of everyone. They will develop sensitivity to the poor and less fortunate. In short, children need the faith formation that a Catholic school offers.
